What an incredible time of year. For us, food is especially at the forefront. It's harvest season, kids are back in school participating in school meal programs and going home with our backpacks full of food, and September is Hunger Action Month.



I am reminded of a poem called 'Harvest Time Is Here Again' by Anita Killick, celebrating this special time of year.

> Harvest time is here again. Cut the corn and sift the grain. Pick the apples on the trees In the chilly autumn breeze. Dig the carrots, parsnips, too. Lots to eat for me and you.



"Lots to eat for me and you," but unfortunately, not everyone can purchase or access the foods they need. According to Feeding America's latest Map the Meal Gap research, <u>1 in 6 people, or 52,660 individuals</u>, struggle with hunger in our 13-county service area. <u>This is up 20% over</u> <u>the previous year</u>. This number <u>includes 1 in 4 children</u>, or a <u>total of</u> <u>16,390 children, up 29%</u>. With the high cost of groceries and living expenses, too many people in our community simply do not have enough money to cover the cost of their groceries.

With harvest season upon us and Hunger Action Month taking place all September, let's remember our neighbors in need and share what we harvest. We can share our extra time, money, and food. On behalf of all those we serve, thank you for helping us take care of our neighbors in West Central Texas.

COMMUNITY PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: SWEETWATER HOUSE OF PEACE (SHOP), SWEETWATER, TX

A Q&A with Becky Acuna, Executive Director

Tell me about Sweetwater House of Peace.

We are a Christian nonprofit. We primarily focus on feeding, clothes, and shelter. Years ago, a building was given to the church that I go to. So, we gathered and considered what we could do with it. We decided to "feed the kids." Actually, that is what our summer programming was originally called ... 'Feed the Kids.' I was made Executive Director. Later, we changed the name to "Summer at the Shop." It's more dignified.

Tell me more about summer at the SHOP.

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In the summer, we do a free summer lunch program. It happens from Monday through Friday, from 11-1, for 9 weeks. All children, 18 and under, are welcome. We've set it up like a Vacation Bible School rotation. We eat, play, recreate, and do crafts. We serve anywhere between 90-120 kids a day at the beginning of summer when kids are still in summer school, but at the end of four weeks, we serve about 180 kids per day.

What else happens at SHOP to end hunger?

We have a Backpack Program that is funded by Food Bank of West Central Texas. It was handed over to us about five years ago by a young lady who used to do it with her family. We serve 100-130 kids, which is a lot for our small town. All five schools in Sweetwater participate in the program. The kids are so excited when they get the backpacks. One family shared, "You have no idea how much these save our lives, how much it helps. We're really grateful."

We also have a food closet that is open once a week. We have a freezer, so we're able to get meat, like ground beef. We like to keep our inventory consistent so people know what they are getting. People say, "I heard I can come here because you help people." And even though the SHOP may not be able to supply their need, we find people who can.

Becky, why did you get involved in this work?

I was a kid that benefited from summer programs in our town. We didn't have a lot growing up. We were hungry. When I was an adult, I decided I didn't want kids to be hungry. We have kids that have been in our program for nearly 10 years. And now they come and volunteer because they love what we do. The goal is for one of these young people who know this program to take over. One day, they will have the key, and they will be unlocking the door to serve.

Anything else for our readers to know?

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One of the best things we ever did was get involved with Food Bank of West Central Texas. One time, I walked into the Food Bank, and I told them I had a hard time keeping up. They asked how much food I needed and helped me on the spot. Everyone there is so nice. I just can't even thank them enough.
